## Songs for the Days

This year, the "Yoms" all fall in May. The Yoms are the series of modern and secular commemorations that come in the days following Passover. Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day; Yom HaZikaron, Israeli Memorial Day; and Yom HaAtzma'ut, Israeli Independence Day. These fall over ten days, and are a mixture of sorrow, hope, and joy.

A few *shirim* (a *shir* is both a poem and a song) for these days that are significant to me:

#### Yom HaShoah v'HaGevurah

Written in Pencil in the Sealed Freightcar
Here in this carload
I am Eve
With my son Abel
If you see my older boy
Cain son of Adam
Tell him that I...

I first encountered this poem at Yad VaShem, Israel's Holocaust Memorial.

Yom HaShoah is officially called: *Yom HaZikaron laShoah v'laGevurah* – Holocaust and Heroes' Remembrance Day. It is set on the 27<sup>th</sup> of Nisan, the day upon which the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising began (April 19, 1943). This was the largest single revolt by Jews during World War II. In

the face of certain defeat and death, they refused to be powerless, and held the German army off for nearly a month. But the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising was not the only source of resistance, which took many forms, in many places.

One of the first organized resistances took place in the Vilna Ghetto, in 1942. Hirsh Glik was a Yiddish poet and editor, born in Vilna in 1922. In 1941, Glik was sent to the Vilna Ghetto, where he became part of the underground resistance, as well as the Ghetto's artistic and intellectual community. He wrote what has come to be known as *The Partisan's Hymn:* 

Never say this is the final road for you, Though leadened skies may cover over days of blue. As the hour that we longed for is so near, Our step beats out the message – we are here!

From lands so green with palms to lands all white with snow,

We shall be coming with our anguish and our woe, And where a spurt of our blood fell on the earth, There our courage and our spirit have rebirth.

The early morning sun will brighten our day, And yesterday with our foe will fade away

This song was written with our blood and not with lead, It's not a little tune that birds sing overhead. This song a people sang amid collapsing walls, With grenades in hand they heeded to the call.

Therefore never say this is the final road for you, Though leadened skies may cover over days of blue. As the hour that we longed for is so near, Our step beats out the message – we are here!

Listen to it <u>here</u> in the original Yiddish, with pictures of resistance fighters.

When I think of a *shir* for Yom HaZikaron, I

think of Rachel Shapira's poem in memory of her childhood friend Eldad Krock, who was killed in one of the most intense battles in 1967's Six Day War, at *Givat Hatachmoshet* (Ammunition Hill).



Unfortunately, due to unresolvable complications, we have had to cancel the May 22 appear-




ance of *The American Way* authors Bonnie Siegler and Helene Stapinski at The Last Chapter.

Our April discussion of Ellen Feldman's *The Living and the Lost* was infinitely enhanced by Rita Fenderson's first-hand recollections of Berlin during the post-war period in which the book is set, as well as her memories of the war itself. The book received universal approval, and we agreed that it would be worth considering other of Feldman's books in the future. Many thanks to Rita as well for her hospitality.

Our May book is *Signal Fires*, by Dani Shapiro. Division Street is full of secrets. An impulsive lie begets a secret—one which will forever haunt the



Wilf family. And the Shenkmans, who move into the neighborhood many years later, bring secrets of their own. Spanning fifty kaleidoscopic years, on a street—and in a galaxy—where stars collapse and stories collide, these two families become bound in ways they never could have imagined. It is a magical story for our times, a literary tour de force by a mas-

terful storyteller at the height of her powers, as luminous meditation on family, memory, and the healing power of interconnectedness.

Our last book, on June 30, will be *The American Way*, by Bonnie Siegler and Helene Stapinski.

**Note:** We switched the May and June books as Bonnie Siegler and Helene Stapinski were originally scheduled to appear at The Next Chapter in April, where we would have had the opportunity to hear them talk about and have them sign our copies of *The American Way* before our own discussion.
