## The Melody of the Maccabees; The Harmony of Joseph

There's an irony to the Hanukkah story.

The tale of the Maccabees is one of Jewish zealots resisting assimilation imposed not only from without (Antiochus prohibiting Temple service and Jewish practices and requiring offerings to pagan gods) but also accepted and promoted from within:

In those days certain renegades came out from Israel and misled many, saying, "Let us go and make a covenant with the Gentiles around us, for since we separated from them many disasters have come upon us."....So they built a gymnasium in Jerusalem, according to Gentile custom, and removed the marks of circumcision, and abandoned the holy covenant....

And Mattathias and his friends went around and ... forcibly circumcised all the uncircumcised boys that they found within the borders of Israel. They hunted down the arrogant, and the work prospered in their hands.

From the perspective of the books of the Maccabees (the text above is from 1 Maccabees 1 & 2) and rabbinic tradition, Hanukkah is the story of the triumph of the "weak against the mighty, the few against the many, the pure against the im-

pure, the righteous against the wicked, and Torah scholars against the insolent."

And often, we see Hanukkah as a narrative of freedom of religion – which the Maccabees did not actually support.

Curiously, there is a counter-melody sung during the Hanukkah season: the story of Joseph. Always read during Hanukkah, the portion *Miketz* 



recounts Pharaoh's dreams of skinny cows and fat cows and full and shriveled ears of grain and Joseph's interpretation of the dreams and subsequent elevation to vizier. Pharaoh gives Joseph his ring, jewelry, new clothes, a chariot, and

eply rooted. Boldly relevant,

also a new name and a wife! Joseph is completely transformed from a "Hebrew youth" he was at the start of the portion into an Egyptian ruler. When his brothers come to him for grain, he is entirely unrecognizable to them.

### The Melody of the Maccabees; The Harmony of Joseph

While the main melody of the holiday sings a song of commitment to a Judaism unsullied by outside influences, the tune of the harmonics is different.

Joseph lives in Egypt, far from his roots. He does not have friends or family nearby to share, celebrate, or observe his heritage. Unlike his father and grandfather, he does not marry someone from his clan. He becomes fully a part of Egyptian society – a powerful political leader and son-in-law of a religious leader.

Our story is much more like Joseph's than like that of the Maccabees'. The Maccabees seem to be religious extremists. Remember, they broke into Jews' homes and forcibly circumcised the sons whose parents had chosen not to circumcise. I am sure they closed the gyms as well.

Joseph, however, lives in "two civilizations," as Kaplan might have said. He does not isolate from the society in which he lives yet remembers his culture. He learns the language and customs of his new home and also gives his sons Hebrew names. And as many of us will join family and friends in their celebration of Christmas, Joseph probably attended ritual observances led by his father-in-law the priest.



We can be fully American – which might mean appreciating the beauty of (tasteful, my bias) Christmas lights and participating in "Secret Santa" at work or school and attending "holiday" parties and even *Messiah* sings – and also fully Jewish. Our Jewish expression might mean making Hanukkah into a bigger celebration than it ever was or is anywhere else so that our kids and grandkids don't feel left out (inflatable lawn dreidels, anyone?). Or it might mean making a beloved traditional recipe or sharing family stories.

Inter-marriage and assimilation are not a threat to the Jewish people. Joseph's ability to speak to Pharaoh and work

with his leaders enabled the survival not just of Egyptians, but of the nascent Jewish people. Later, Moses, Prince of Egypt, raised by Pharaoh's daughter, whose life is saved by his Midianite wife who circumcises their child (non-Jewish women raising Jewish children have a long history!) leads us out of slavery, into freedom, and to Sinai and Torah.

We have always loved other people. We have always integrated and adapted. We evolve in response to our circumstances. This is the secret not only to our endurance, but to our flourishing. The Maccabees may be the melody we know, but Joseph is the harmony we live. ❖






