BLACK JEWS IN AMERICA

eply rooted. Boldly relevant,

February is Black History Month in the US. Why is this relevant for a synagogue newsletter? Because there is a long history of Black Jews in America.

When I was in college in New York City, I met Yowkanon, who grew up in a Black Jewish congregation in Harlem. Perhaps his congregation was the Royal Order of Ethiopian Hebrews, or the Commandment Keepers Ethiopian Hebrew Congregation, or B'nai Adath Kol Yisroel, or Kohol Beth B'nai Yisroel, or Beth Banai Abraham, or the Moorish Zionist Temple. (More information on the Harlem communities here.)

For many Black Jews of these communities, their connection to Jewishness was rooted in a claim to Ethiopian heritage. Some stories are similar to those of other crypto-Jews. Rabbi Louise Dailey, founder of the Black Israelite synagogue in Philadelphia, recounted that her father was an orthodox Baptist minister, but was, however, unorthodox in that he would gather the men of the community, and have Bible study on Saturdays. Reverend Spencer also had a strange habit of wearing his hat at all times. Rabbi Dailey could not remember seeing him without it. The family salted their meat before cooking it, and they covered the mirrors when there was a death in the

family, sitting quietly in darkened rooms for seven days. The Spencer family were strict about "Sabbath" worship, which for them was Sunday. The family was not allowed to do any work, play in the streets, go to the theater, or have any other pleasures on that day, in honor of the directive in the Commandments. Mother Dailey once worked as a domestic in a Jewish home and recognized the practices she saw there as those of her father.

While Israelite and "mainstream" Jewish communities have not often come together, the congregation that she founded, Congregation Temple Beth'El, in Northwest Philadelphia, has long had connections with the establishment/white Jewish community. Conservative Rabbi Seymour Rosenbloom worked with the congregation for many years, and the current rabbi and daughter of the founder has taken classes at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College.

Rabbi Capers Funnye is the Chief Rabbi of the International Israelite Board of Rabbis (and a cousin of former First Lady Michelle Obama) and is a member of the Chicago Board of Rabbis and sits on the board of the Jewish Council on Urban Affairs. Perhaps we might reach out to the Israelite community in St. Albans, Beth Elohim Hebrew Congregation?

Sometimes, we use the word "Yiddishkeit" to mean Jewishness – and to be fair, that is what it means. But it refers to Ashkenazi Jewish culture, the culture of Jews from Eastern Europe. But Jews spoke - and speak - many Jewish languages: Ladino, Judeo-Arabic, Judeo-Italian, Judeo-Persian, Judeo-Aramaic, Judeo-Marathi, Judeo-Malayalam, Judeo-Tat, and Bukharian, among others. Be'chol Lashon (Hebrew for "in every language") is an organization that seeks to raise awareness about the ethnic, racial and cultural diversity of Jewish identity and experience. The Jewish Multiracial Network hosts (pre-pandemic) an annual retreat for Jews of Color and multiracial families. <u>Jews in all Hues</u> supports Jews of Color and multi-heritage Jews.

Our Lunch & Learn group recently read *Love-song*, Julius Lester's memoir about his conversion to Judaism. As a Black man who converted in 1988, he felt his only model was Sammy Davis, Jr.

Today, he would have more company. Whether due to conversion, adoption, multiracial families, or lineage going back thousands of years, today there are many more Black Jews as members, leaders, and rabbis in the mainstream Jewish community. Our own community reflects this reality.

Reconstructing Judaism, our movement's national body, established a <u>Jews of Color and Allies Advisory Group</u>, to "ensure that our Jewish communities provide a safe, supportive, loving and empowering haven for all of us, most especially Jews of Color." To this end, the Board of Reconstructing Judaism adopted <u>Commitments to Racial Justice</u> recommended by the advisory group.

As we enter Black History Month, we remember that there are many members of our Kehillath Shalom and wider Jewish community for whom Black history is personal. It is their own history,

and that of their parents, children, partners. The Jewish people is, and has always been, a diverse community, from the moment of the exodus from Egypt, when the "mixed multitude" left with the children of Israel and became part of them. Let us, as the RJ Commitments state: "acknowledge and embrace the full, beautiful expanse of the Jewish people." •



It was also chosen to be in February since Lincoln (2/12) and Frederick Douglass (2/14) both have birthdays this month.

Who will be sending candy or flowers on Febhas it that Valentine was a priest in the third cen-








MOVIES & MUNCHIES Denial

She was awarded the prestigious Ruth Lilly Poetry Prize in 2007, the judges noting: "One always feels the looming humaneness around Lucille Clifton's poems—it is a moral quality that some poets have and some don't." She was the first author to have two books of poetry chosen as finalists for the Pulitzer Prize, Good Woman: Poems and a Memoir, 1969-1980 and Next: New Poems. Her collection Two-Headed Woman was also a Pulitzer nominee. Maryland's poet laureate from 1974 until 1985, she won the prestigious National Book Award for Blessing the Boats: New and Selected Poems, 1988-2000. In addition to her numerous poetry collections, she wrote many children's books. She died in 2010. .
