# A Response to Hate

This year, <u>Abraham's Table</u>, the Long Island multi-faith organization, is planning a variety of activities during Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day weekend on this weekend that would have been Dr. King's 94<sup>th</sup> birthday. We are calling the commemoration: Becoming A Beloved Community...A Long Island Interfaith Response to Hate.

The mission of Abraham's Table Long Island is "to create a spirit of common heritage, peace, and cooperation while respecting the uniqueness of the Jewish, Christian and Muslim religions." Since coming to KSS, I have participated annually in Abraham's Table's MLK commemorations. This year's commemoration

is more extensive in response to increased hateful rhetoric and incidents. Hate is again on the rise, across the United States and here on Long Island.

Despite the fact that many hate crimes go unreported, U.S. Department of Justice data show that in New York State hate crimes rose by 31 percent between 2018 and 2020.

• In April of this year, the ADL reported that New York State led the nation in antisemitic acts. • In late July, vicious antisemitic flyers were distributed on lawns in Rockville Centre.

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- On July 4, a firebomb was thrown at a sacred symbol in front of Fatima Al-Zahra Mosque in Ronkonkoma.
- In February, a Bayport man was charged with

sending dozens of hate-filled letters to Long Island LGBTQ organizations.

Jews, most of the key faith leaders in Germany at that time were silent. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a Lutheran pastor, was one of the few Germans who denounced Nazi hatred of the Jews. Pastor Bonhoeffer said this of Nazi hatred: "Silence in the face of evil is itself evil. God will not hold us guiltless. Not to speak is to speak. Not to act is to act." As *Time* magazine reported in an article commemorating Kristallnacht, "The Holocaust didn't start

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with killing; it started with words."

I write this on the first night of Hanukkah, when my colleagues across faith and ethnic groups are reaching out to send wishes of blessing to the Jewish community, in much greater numbers than I have seen in the past. It is quite heartwarming and comforting. These are colleagues whose communities have seen increased hate speech directed against them, as well. On Long Island, we know that we need to come together. The only way to fight hatred is through solidarity.

Another German Lutheran minister, Martin Niemoller, wrote words that are so familiar that they might seem cliché:

> First, they came for the Communists And I did not speak out Because I was not a Communist Then they came for the Socialists And I did not speak out Because I was not a Socialist Then they came for the trade unionists And I did not speak out Because I was not a trade unionist Then they came for the Jews And I did not speak out Because I was not a Jew Then they came for me And there was no one left To speak out for me

Despite the familiarity of the

words, we should not tune them out. We must care for the vulnerable other both simply because they are vulnerable, and also in our own interest. Some have said to me, why focus on other communities when ours is in need? And especially when some of the hatred is coming from the other communities?

A world that is unsafe for Asian Americans, or Black Americans, or Muslim Americans is also unsafe for Jews. Hillel spoke to this almost two thousand years before Niemoller:

If I am not for myself, who will be for me?

And when I am for myself alone, what am I?

And if not now, then when?

We must understand: there's no such thing as "Black antisemitism," in the same way that there is

no such thing as "Jewish racism." There is racism and there is antisemitism, and these affect and implicate all of us. None of us are immune, and we work to overcome and raise awareness of the pervasive biases in our environments and to repair the systemic inequities in our society. We must be for ourselves, and we must be for each other.

In 2010, I had the opportunity to bring Calvin Ramsey's play, *The Green Book*, to Yale University. The play illustrates the complications and complexity of African-American life during the Jim Crow era and presents a dramatic intersection of the lives of a Holocaust survivor and an African-American salesman. It takes its title from *The Green Book*, published 1936-1963, which listed roadside accommodations that served African Americans.

Over twenty years ago, Calvin brought *The Green Book* back to the public arena. His children's book, *Ruth and the Green Book*, inspired the Academy Award-winning film, *The Green Book*. He reached out to me a few months ago and I am pleased that he will be coming to KSS on MLK Weekend. He will be in conversation with us over dinner on **Sunday, January 15<sup>th</sup> at 5 pm**. He

will speak with us about his play and the real people who inspired its characters. <u>RSVP to me</u> by Thursday, January 12. RSVP essential! On Monday morning, he will offer a reading and conversation about *Ruth and the Green Book* in conjunction with our MLK Day of Service. Following his presentation, we will be making a meal for the guests of Helping Hands Rescue Mission. Pro-

gram begins at 9:30 am; <u>RSVP to me.</u> This will be one of many opportunities offered by the Abraham's Table community that weekend.

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day has always spoken deeply to me, as an American. King did not despair of what America could be. Even in times of racial terror, violence, segregation, and inequality, he believed we could be better and we could do better. He believed we could become a "beloved community." In this, he echoes the Hebrew prophets, and Jewish tradition, which tells us it is forbidden to despair and calls us to work to build a better world.

Last month, I was in Washington, DC, for the first time in a long while and had the opportunity to see the <u>MLK Memorial</u> for the first time. As I



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approached it, I saw the carving of his figure out of stone. Behind his figure, there are two large stones flanked by marble with many of his famous quotes. Walking around, I did not understand the large stones. They had no words on them and were generally uncarved. As I walked around, I came to the back of the stone out of which King is carved. On its side is written: "out of the mountain of despair a



stone of hope." This quote is from the speech King gave at the March on Washington in 1963: "We will be able to hew out of the mountain of despair a stone of hope." And from the back, it is clear that the stone from which King's figure is carved, came from the two large stones behind it. Truly, from despair, came hope. May we be inspired, once again, to hope, and to act, for all of us. 🛠

February 19 — *The Oracle of Stamboul,* by Michael David Lukas


March 19 — *Plunder: A Memoir of Family Property and Nazi Treasure,* by Menachem Kaiser




