It was supposed to be "Hot Vax Summer" – the opportunity to remove our masks, leave our houses, and (re)connect with people. And it was, for a few days. Now, the masks are back on and we have more people joining us by Zoom than inperson. It seems that "the more things change, the more they remain the same" (Jean-Baptiste Alphonse Karr). Or, as *Kohelet* says in the Bible: there is nothing new under the sun.

This series of clichés points to a truth in our High Holiday observances. The calendar turns and we come back to the same prayers every year, the identical pattern of the shofar blasts, the beloved melodies, the familiar holiday recipes. And the same questions about our lives: Where are we coming from? Where are we going? How are we doing? What steps do I need to take to grow, to repair my relationships, my world?

One thing that some might find surprising is that our answers might be similar year after year. We find that we make the same commitments. We are ourselves; we don't switch out our struggles, our personalities – strengths and weaknesses – for new ones. While that might be frustrating to some (I'm still dealing with this?!?), it makes sense. In the words of systems theorist

Peter Senge, "Reality is made up of circles, but we see straight lines."

Much of nature is, in fact, made up of spirals. The "golden spiral" is related to the Fibonacci sequence, a pattern of structure and design that replicates itself throughout creation. We see these spirals in plants:

In animals:




In our own bodies:

In Einstein's theory of general relativity, which I do not claim to understand, even time does not move in a straight line. He understood space and time to be interwoven into a single continuum known as space-time. One manifestation of this is gravitational waves, depicted here as created by two colliding black holes. Notice the spiral:



As so much of creation is a spiral, so, too, our lives. We might wish the world, our lives, were linear, but they are not. We move forward, and come back to ourselves, perhaps in a slightly different place.

The word of this season is *teshuvah*, sometimes translated "repentance," but which literally means "returning." The <u>Shaker Hymn</u> (perhaps originally a dance, with the directions included in the last three lines), invited us to turn, and turn again, until we find our place.

'Tis the gift to be simple, 'tis the gift to be free, 'Tis the gift to come down, where we ought to be, And when we find ourselves in the place just right, 'Twill be in the valley of love and delight. When true simplicity is gain'd, To bow and to bend we shan't be ashamed, To turn, turn will be our delight Till by turning, turning we come round right.

Maimonides taught that we know we have done *teshuvah* when we are faced with the same situation and make a different choice. When we have come back to the same place, and were able to act differently. We walk, not towards some end goal, but deeper and deeper into our beautiful, sacred center. \diamondsuit

(Some of) What We Learned **ON OUR SUMMER VACATION**

1) WE ARE NOT ALONE. We are part of a large and growing community of Reconstructionist Jews (as well as Jews from the other movements) committed to working together to build a more perfect (equitable, fair) union. Stay tuned to this space for more information in the coming months about inspiring speakers who will talk with us – in evening programs, and during Shabbat morning services. These include Rabbi Sandra Lawson, who works to help Reconstructing Judaism realize its deeply held aspiration of becoming an anti-racist organization and movement; and members of sister organizations such as ERASE Racism.

2) HATE DOESN'T TAKE A VACATION. According to the Huntington Anti-Bias Task Force, there were several incidents of that made our blood boil - racial epithets and swastikas scrawled in public places in our county. As well, too many school districts in our county have taken up arms in a cause few understand. That is, Critical Race Theory is not a curriculum and is not in danger of being taught in our local schools. The NYS Department of Education suggested implementation of a Culturally Responsive-Sustain Education that will, among other goals, "...develop students' abilities to connect across lines of difference; elevate historically marginalized voices; and empower students as agents of social change."

3) AN AUGUST SUNDAY AFTERNOON IS NOT THE BEST TIME TO PLAN AN INTERFAITH **PICNIC.** Despite the best intentions, our joint picnic with the Noor Mosque had to be canceled not out of lack of interest, not at all, but because too many people had planned vacations. We will try to reschedule.

4) YOU CAN WATCH AN OLD MOVIE WITH **NEW EYES.** Accordingly, the first Committee for Racial Justicesponsored Movies and Munchies night will take place on Wednesday, November 17th when we will discuss *The Help*. You can watch it on your own or with friends from the congregation on Wednesday, November 3.

What is Reverse Tashlich?

On Rosh HaShanah, Jews around the world participate in the ancient ritual of Tashlich. We go to a body of water and symbolically cast off the sins of the past year by throwing breadcrumbs into the water to start the New Year with purity of heart. However, this is not the only time humans cast their "sins" into the sea. Every year, approximately six million tons of human-made trash enter the water, posing health and safety hazards to the animals that call the sea their home. We are joining <u>Repair the Sea</u> to add a modern ritual to the Jewish tradition: a beach clean-up on the Sunday between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

At our event, we will symbolically leave the past behind, care for creation through clean up, call ourselves and our community to responsibility and responsiveness through the sounding of the shofar, and share sweetness and wishes for the New Year.




